

Revolutionary Rhineland photography

When people talk about German photography, what immediately springs to mind are works by members of the Düsseldorf School of Photography, also known as the Becher School. It is famous around the world for its

high artistic standards and the way it revolutionised photography. Founded by Bernd and Hilla Becher in the 1970s, the school brought fresh ideas to the international arts scene. The typical Becher style became one of Düsseldorf's most successful exports. Thomas Struth, Thomas Ruff and Andreas Gursky won global acclaim for their large-format works, while Candida Höfer and Axel Hütte also launched international careers. Today, the legacy of these artists and the relevance of photography as art form can be seen in photography exhibitions at the city's museums, art centres, galleries and off-spaces. Institutions such as the Kunstpalast museum, which significantly expanded its photography portfolio with the acquisition of Galerie Kicken's collection, play host to exhibitions that underline Düsseldorf's status as a city of photography.

düsseldorf photo+: This biennial shows how the scene has evolved over the decades and is still pushing the boundaries of photography today. Every two years, the festival's workshops, panels, lectures and exhibitions invite visitors to engage with contemporary photography and challenge their perception of visual media.

The Sound of Düsseldorf

Düsseldorf has always provided fertile ground for influential and successful pop music, and is still a leading centre of German pop. The band Kraftwerk, for example, are celebrated as pioneers of electronic music. At the end of the 1970s, the Ratinger Hof became the centre of German punk music and the Neue Deutsche Welle genre that followed. It was here that the band ZK, which would later become Die Toten Hosen, had their first performances, Fehlfarben played music from their groundbreaking album 'Monarchie und Alltag' and DAF got the crowds bouncing. The local music scene is just as lively today, as proven by bands such as Broilers, Antilopen Gang and Love Machine.

Over the past 50 years, Düsseldorf has inspired painters and photographers as much as it has musicians. The band NEU! was formed in Düsseldorf's

Kunsthalle, an avant-garde exhibition space, and would go on to influence the likes of David Bowie, Blur, Placebo, Radiohead, Sonic Youth and Stereolab. Kraftwerk's first concerts took place at Creamcheese, a bar where Joseph Beuys, Anatol Herzfeld and Günther Uecker were regular visitors.



The loudest city tour in town: The Altstadt (Old Town) in Düsseldorf is a big draw for music lovers. This is where the roots of electronic pioneers Kraftwerk lie, where Die Toten Hosen refined their punk sound and where DJs now play the latest dance music at the famous Salon des Amateurs. Our pop music tour, The Sound of Düsseldorf, visits legendary clubs, bars and other places that have influenced the city's sound. The guides are local music journalists, and you can listen to the biggest tunes made in Düsseldorf along the way.

Between Rhine, Kunstakademie and Hofgarten

Düsseldorf offers a surprising amount of art in a relatively small area. Throughout the year, the many museums and galleries within walking distance between the Rhine and Hofgarten park offer exceptional art experiences. Modern art features alongside the works of both young and established contemporary artists. During summer, the inner courtyard of the Ehrenhof buildings is a must-see for many museum visitors.

No other city of this size is home to so many leading international artists and to so many galleries, and nowhere is art such an integral part of everyday life.

Düsseldorf's Kunstakademie – the Academy of Arts – is the heart and soul of the city. Joseph Beuys, Sigmar Polke, Jörg Immendorff, Gerhard Richter, Andreas Gursky, Katharina Fritsch – renowned artists have always studied and taught there, and to this day Düsseldorf owes its international reputation as a city of art to the academy. Twice a year, the academy organises a tour during which the students showcase their latest work.

The fact that art runs through the city's veins is in no small part down to Joseph Beuys, who found fame with felt and fat. Beuys, who was a professor at the Academy of Arts from 1961 to 1972, courted controversy with his works and his ideas. Infamous is the story of his piece 'Fat Corner', which was mopped up by an overzealous cleaner. One of his legacies to the city is a quote that defines Düsseldorf to this day: "Everyone is an artist".

A long tradition of art: The trail leads from the painters of the Düsseldorf school of painting in the 19th century via Paul Klee, the ZERO artists Heinz Mack, Otto Piene and Günther Uecker, and the great photographers of the Becher School all the way to the present day.

The world of galleries and collectors

When it comes to visual arts, Düsseldorf boasts a broad alternative scene, several foundations and more than 100 galleries. Many art institutions and collections owe their existence to generous patrons, for example, the Julia Stoschek Foundation in Oberkassel, Sammlung Philara in Flingern and the KAI 10 | ARTHENA FOUNDATION in MedienHafen. Düsseldorf's galleries see themselves as forums for the city's vibrant arts scene, and focus on presenting and promoting work by young artists and graduates from the city's Academy of Arts.

During the DC Open event in September, galleries in Düsseldorf and Cologne showcase established and up-and-coming artists from Friday to Sunday. In spring, young art meets old industrial architecture during the Art Düsseldorf fair, held at the Areal Böhler complex in Oberkassel.

On the other side of the Rhine, Julia Stoschek's private museum is another jewel in Düsseldorf's crown. The Julia Stoschek Foundation presents contemporary art with a focus on time-based media. Stoschek has a penchant for video art, installations and photography. "The art of my generation," as she puts it.

The Langen Foundation's roots lie in the collection of patron Marianne Langen and her husband, Viktor. The foundation's exhibition building by Japanese architect Tadao Ando is itself a work of art. The Langen Foundation focuses on the dialogue between the cultures of the Orient and the Occident and how this is explored through contemporary art.

Located in the countryside not far from the city, Museum Insel Hombroich is a world apart. The museum in Neuss, just half an hour from Düsseldorf, includes more than a dozen build-

There are three particularly art-focused areas linked by the Academy of Arts: the ensemble of historical buildings around Ehrenhof, the Old Town and the district of Carlstadt.

The ZERO movement, founded in Düsseldorf in 1958, revolutionised art in the post-war period. Heinz Mack, Otto Piene and Günther Uecker created art from light and movement, and air and fire. Today, the ZERO foundation is dedicated to researching and showcasing this international group of avant-garde artists. It is only open for exhibitions and events.

Art:walk

The Art:walk in the heart of the city is an exceptional museum mile, and it's not just the art on display that is extraordinary. Along the route lie some of the city's most beautiful locations and heritage-listed parks: Hofgarten park, Königsallee and the Kö-Bogen, Ständehauspark and the Rhine promenade. For just €25, the Art:walk48 ticket offers unlimited access to the collections and exhibitions in the six large museums that line the route.

K20, a museum of modernism and post-1945 art with an international profile, showcases masterpieces by Paul Klee, Pablo Picasso, Max Ernst and Joseph Beuys, as well as highlights from American pop art. Works by pioneering painters such as Carmen Herrera, Paula Modersohn-Becker and Lygia Pape are also on show. The Kunstpalast takes you on a journey through international art history. Its eclectic collection includes medieval sculptures, paintings by Rubens and contemporary art. The Kunstpalast also houses an internationally renowned glass museum, showcases Japanese and Islamic art, and hosts special exhibitions on art, photography, design, fashion and music. The collection was reopened in late summer 2023 with an extended programme for families and children. **For friends of exploring the grey area between art and design**

The Kunsthalle and Kunstverein have been located in the concrete building on Grabbeplatz square since the 1960s. Joseph Beuys would have liked to have seen the building blown up, but today its brutalist architecture is considered visionary. The Kunsthalle hosts avant-garde shows that always draw an international audience. What looks like the museum's café is in fact a club specialising in electronic music, the Salon des Amateurs, whose DJs are known around the world. The building as art – the famous stovepipe installation by Beuys passes through the gallery wall to the outside. **For friends of experiments and international events**

H Kunstsammlung NRW K21 Ständehaus

The K21 is the museum for international contemporary art, and the Renaissance Revival building that houses it features an impressive glass roof. The museum's collection includes works by international artists such as Ai Weiwei, Andreas Gursky, Hito Steyerl, Rosemarie Trockel, Wolfgang Tillmans and Marina Abramović. Beneath the glass dome hangs Tomás Saraceno's net installation, within which visitors can move about high above the floor below. **For friends of the unusual, the bizarre and the noisy**

KIT is a 140 metre long, subterranean exhibition space right underneath the Rhine promenade. The exhibitions mounted here showcase contemporary art by recent graduates of the Academy of Arts in the genres of sculpture, painting, photography, video and installation art. A visit to the KIT Café, which rises like a monolith on the banks of the Rhine, is highly recommended.
