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Historic Old Town



One of most beautiful little towns in Germany, according to the travel guides. Entering Gengenbach's Old Town is like stepping onto a film set: Half-timbered buildings as far as the eye can see, towers, gates, pretty little corners and narrow streets all in harmony. There are plenty of reasons why this is one of the most popular destinations for day trips in the Black Forest. The Old Town, which is a conservation area, is ideal for a walk

steeped in history, past Baroque patricians' houses and the impressive Town Hall, in front of which a knight stands guard on the market fountain, into the romantic narrow streets where time seems to stand still. In the Old Town alone, four museums present high-quality exhibitions covering subjects as diverse as timber rafting, military history, the history of fools and carnival, and art of the highest calibre.

It is also worth visiting the former monastery and, next to it, the impressive tower of the Church of St Mary - one of the most beautiful Baroque church towers in South Germany. The town wall with its battlement walk and imposing Kinzigtor and Obertor Towers, which give a hint of the defensive fortifications of olden days, also bear witness to the rich past of the town. Elegant living and pleasures for the senses are also available à la carte: superb local wines, typical regional cuisine and gourmet specialities. Here, what goes onto the plate is growing right on the doorstep.





In the side valleys, we then find the real Black Forest: Picture-book Black Forest farms and a unique landscape between the vineyards and the Black Forest. You can enjoy nature on its own or in a successful combination with art. Don't miss the open-air exhibitions staged by the ARTIST group of artists in the vineyards or on the Philosophers' Path. The "Lothar Monument" on the Siedigkopf mountain with its fantastic panoramic view is impressive. The 12 m high sculpture by artist Norbert Feger commemorates the "Christmas Hurricane" of 1999.

In Advent, the Town Hall is transformed into the world's largest Advent Calendar. Works by internationally famous artists from Chagall to Warhol turn it into a unique winter fairy tale that looks like the front of a fabulous doll's house. The whole







Churches



One of the defining elements of Gengenbach's charming skyline is St Martin's Church, a church with a choir tower which is unique in Ortenau; the other is the former Benedictine abbey church, now the parish church of St Mary. It is joined to the palace-like main abbey building, which now contains the presbytery and a technical university.



The interior of St Martin's Church (15th century) is designed in a unpretentious Baroque style; the organ has a distinctive double case, making it one of the most unusual Baroque organs in Baden. The church's bell tower is a magnificent

example of South German Baroque tower building; the 12th century main church has three naves, containing a wide selection of paintings and sculptures depicting salvation scenes from the Bible (re-Romanisation 1892-1906). Baden's second largest organ from the Romantic period (38 stops) fills the "basilica in the Kinzig Valley" with its music. The inner courtyard garden and herb garden recall the times when the church was still part of a monastery. A walk up the hill known as the "Bergle" takes you to the 17th century Chapel of St James (Jakobuskapelle) and the nearby Chapel of the Holy Sepulchre, with its stunning view over the town and the Kinzig Valley landscape.



Löwenberg House



Located in an 18th century patrician house in the heart of the Old Town of Gengenbach, the Löwenberg House Museum is home to exhibitions and events of the highest calibre, with the focus on temporary exhibitions of contemporary art, painting, photography and object art. Guided tours, lectures, matinées and workshops attract a broad range of visitors. The kinetic objects presented in the exhibition rooms are islands inviting visitors to spend time, look and marvel. During Advent, they correspond to the Advent Calendar. The museum

shop supplements the presentations by offering an unusual range of gifts.

Rafting and Transport Museum



The museum is in what used to be the gatekeeper's house near the bridge over the River Kinzig. The main themes are as follows:



"Niggelturm" Museum



The finest carnival museum in southern Germany. The museum is housed in a 14th century tower and is spread over 7 floors. The visitor can see exactly what happens during the carnival in Gengenbach and can admire masks and costumes from all over the Swabian-Alemannic region. A multi-media show and the view of the town from the top of the tower all go to make it an unforgettable experience. Opening hours: 1 April to 31 October: Wednesday + Saturday: 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday and Bank Holidays: 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. During Advent daily. Special guided tours on request.



Franciscan Convent



The extensive convent complex with garden is home to the "Parament Museum" (museum of sacred textile art), the beautiful Neo-Baroque mother house church and the "Room of Silence" designed by the artist Eberhard Münch. In the candle workshop with adjoining convent shop, it is possible to watch the sisters artistically decorating the candles. Visitors can also learn all about the history and life of the convent in quided tours.

Opening hours, convent shop and candle workshop:

Museum Kinzigtorturm



The 13th century defence tower and gate is now a museum depicting the history of the imperial city as a stronghold since it was founded in 1230 AD

From the lookout you get a beautiful view of the historic town centre

Local History Museum Ketterer House



The "Ketterer House" is named after its last private owner, the "Ketterer" smithy, and is one of the oldest and finest buildings in the Kinzig Valley. The half-timbered building has construction features that date back to the 17th century. Today, it houses the Biberach Local History Museum. A walk around takes you through the various areas of life of the idyllic Black Forest village of Biberach. You can see how people used to live and work here and discover more about their customs and communities

Opening hours: May to October: Tuesday: 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Every first and third Sunday in the month: 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Special visits and guided tours are possible on request.

Historic Old Town



The historic charm of Zell am Harmersbach

Medieval half-timbered buildings and Jugendstil facades, picturesque corners and side streets, little shops and cafés are what give Zell its charm.

Many of the town's buildings still provide a glimpse into the history of what used to be the smallest Imperial town in the Holy Roman Empire.

There are even some signs of the founding of the town in 1330: There is the striking Stork Tower in the town centre, the "Hirschturm" - the former bastioned tower. or the "alte Wäschkuchi" - the town's first laundry, where the housewives would laboriously wash their washing in the industrial stream and gossip about everything under the sun.

An interesting fact: Zell was an early place of pilgrimage, with the pilgrimage church of "St Mary of the Chains" amongst one of the largest pilgrimage churches in the Black Forest.

If you would like to explore our little town on your own, simply follow the markings on the ground to discover the historic hiahliahts of Zell.

Tip: Free guided tours of the town on Tuesdays in May to October.







Stork Tower



The almost 700 year-old Stork Tower is the emblem of the town of Zell am Harmersbach and has housed the town's museum since 1960.

In the Middle Ages, the Tower was used as a starvation dungeon and prison. The exhibition includes the prison with the "shame bell", thumbscrews and other instruments of torture, plus 3500 craft exhibits, pictures, minerals and coins, an

old dolls' house, Black Forest clocks and tableware from Zeller Ceramics. Highlights: The "Orchestrion Zamba" mechanical musical instrument and the

Basel Dance of Death in terracotta.



Motorcycle and Toy Museum




Walter Breig's museum in Zell a. H. is a real treat for motorcycle fans, with more than 80 original motorcycles from nine decades on display. Here, visitors can actually feel the spirit of the age of motorised two-wheel travel - every motorbike fan and collector will

be delighted. All of the motorcycles themselves are carefully displayed. In addition, there are over 2000 examples of tin toys. Toy cars, toy motor cycles, toy coaches and even good old trains are all here! An absolute joy for children and adults.



Fürstenberger Hof



The Fürstenberger Hof Local Museum in Zell-Unterharmersbach presents the everyday life of Black Forest farmers 50, 100 and even 300 years ago. The typical Kinzig Valley farmhouse has been a museum of local history since 1974. The house, stall and barn are all under one roof. There is so much to discover in the

collection of farming exhibits from the last 300 years. The building is fully furnished as if the family had simply upped and left, offering visitors the chance to really feel and experience how they lived.



Villa Haiss



Modern art in a small Black Forest town with at least 120 works by photographers, painters, sculptors, graphic designers and object artists. Walter Bischoff has been exhibiting in the spacious rooms of the former industrialist's home, the Villa Haiss since 1997. The sheer range of international art from the last 60 years is wonderfully inspiring. A particularly eyecatching piece is the brightly painted

section of the Berlin Wall, 6 m wide and 3.4 m high. The unusual piece of contemporary history enriches the broad spectrum of contemporary art presented by gallery owner Walter Bischoff in his museum.





Zeller Ceramics



The Zeller Ceramics factory (founded in 1794) is one of the oldest ceramics manufacturers in Germany. Its most famous design, the "Rooster and Hen" started its triumphal march around the world in 1898. Alongside this traditional tableware, the Zeller Ceramics factory produces many hand-painted designs in the modern country house style.

The factory outlet has an attractive range of designs and shapes on sale. In the company's museum, visitors can admire exhibits from over 200 years of company history and watch the tableware being painted.

Gallus Saw & Lourdes Grotto



The Gallus Saw is located at the entrance to the Zuwald Valley and was used as a "Hofsäge" for sawing up tree trunks using water power. The building was erected in 1834 and is now a small museum, with information boards. This means that it is open for viewing at any time. The saw still works perfectly, but is only used for display purposes. Dates of displays are published in the community events calendar. Directly opposite stands the Lourdes Grotto, opened in 1926. It is intended to commemorate those who died or disappeared in the two World Wars.

Historic Storehouse & Old Mill



This fine example of the farming heritage of the typical Black Forest village stands at the centre of the Rathausplatz in Oberharmershach With the storehouse dating from 1761, the mill with workings from the 19th century and the old bakery, the museum complex provides an accurate insight into the ways in which people lived and worked in days gone by.

The exhibits have all been provided by the people of the village.

Brandenkopf with Viewing Tower



The Brandenkopf, at 945 m above sea level, is the highest elevation in the Central Black Forest. The view from the Viewing Tower, which is around 30 m high, brings the Rhine Valley, the Vosges mountains and, on a clear day, the Alps, a little bit closer. In addition to the sandstone tower, the mountain restaurant with hiking hostel and play area and the many hiking paths and mountain-

bike routes makes the Brandenkopf a popular destination. Winter hikes along the signposted snowshoe routes are also possible. Walkers on the famous "Westweg" long-distance hiking path will reach the Brandenkopf at Stage 6 from Harkhof in the direction of Hausach.







Adventure Minigolf

Local History and Distillery Museum



The museum is next to Steinach's landmark, the "Schwarzer Adler", a half-timbered house built in 1716. The exhibits are divided into various categories. In the History, Tradition and Customs area, you will find a furnished farmhouse living room, traditional costumes and the figures for the "Klausenbigger" procession on St Nicholas Day.

The ground floor also contains a collection of minerals and a corner depicting timber transport by river.

The top floor is dedicated to various crafts and farm life. A small still (over 100 years old) illustrates an important source of income for the local farmers. Visitors can also enjoy a special exhibition that changes annual and a crib scene during Advent.



Storehouse Museum



To save the storehouse of the Schwendenseppenhof in Welschensteinach from collapsing, it was restored from the ground up in 2001 using the original building techniques.

The masonry was formed from quarry stones jointed with loam. The cellar ceiling was lined with clay rolls and the roof covered with straw.

The 18th century granary is very well preserved. It was added later – the storehouse itself is much older. It is now used as a museum displaying everything that farming life in Welschensteinach

involved earlier: Long forgotten agricultural implements and tools, household objects and work clothing plus local traditional costumes. There is also an exhibition of religious images and objects, plus artefacts from schools and associations.

Church of the Holy Cross



Steinach is home to one of the most beautiful Baroque churches, and the only one with a bulbous spire. The foundations of the spire date back to around 1150. The one surviving Gothic remnant is the tabernacle, from around 1480, in the basement of the tower. The parish church as it stands today dates from 1750. Highlights inside the church include the high altar, the two side altars, a picture of the Lord's Prayer and a medieval pietà next to the pulpit.

The sculptor Joseph Kaltenbach created some of the beautiful sculptures. The church shines in fully glory after its recent renovation, when the simple light fittings were replaced by more appropriate magnificent chandeliers.

Chapel of St Mary of the Snow



A thorough, extensive renovation from the spring to the end of 2015 has preserved the chapel, which was modelled on the "Santa Maria ad Nives" in Rome, as a pretty, historic gem.

The oldest part of the "Snow Chapel", which is now the choir, was probably built in the Late Gothic period in the second half of the 15th century and was first mentioned in the "Waydbrief" of 1522. The nave, built in the Baroque style, was built in 1715-1716, with both parts being matched to each other.

A Baroque alter dating from the early 18th century adorns the little church, which is lit by six leaded glass windows.

One of the most culturally valuable items is the wooden coffered ceiling from 1785, with 42 symbols from the Litany of Loreto. Opening hours:

Historic Old Town



Town hall / weekly market

Haslach is a very old town - the first settlement here dates back to Roman times. Haslach blossomed for the first time in the 13th century, when the town was the seat of the mining court and became the centre of an important silver mining district. From the 17th century, Haslach continued to develop as a market town. Its market streets and squares, which were broad for the time, have survived



completely to this day and, together with the narrow alleys filled with houses and workshops, give the picturesque old town a unique flair. Haslach is a member of the "Deutsche Fachwerkstrasse", the tourist route through the most attractive German medieval towns. With almost 60



small shops, bistros, cafés and restaurants across the medieval town, which is precisely 300 m in diameter within the town walls, Haslach is a lively destination that offers something extra.

Learn about this picturesque little Black Forest town, past and present, in one of the informative and entertaining guided walks, which last about 1.5 hours.

The themed and costume tours. such as the "Midwives' Tour", the "Swineherd Tour" and the "Petticoat und Brausetour", are particularly popular.



Vulkan Concentration Camp Memorial



The memorial site commemorates 1700 prisoners from 20 different countries who were abused, tortured and made to do forced labour in three Nazi concentration camps during the last eight months of the Second World War.

Twelve information boards tell the story of the concentration camp in words and pictures. Seating for up to 35 people

provides an opportunity for discussions and teaching for school groups on longer visits. Guided tours for groups of visitors can be booked in advance.

"Segen Gottes" Silver Mine



The old "Segen Gottes" silver mine is one of the most important historic mines in the Black Forest. The mine has witnessed around 800 years of mining history. Silver-bearing fluorspar and heavy spar corridors of rare beauty have been opened up on three levels in the mine. The mine's treasures also include crystal deposits, stalagmites and stalactites unlike those in any other historic mines in the region, plus tunnels



hewn out with hammers and picks in an incredible state of preservation, historic winching chambers, doorframe timbers and work platforms.

Urenkopf Tower



On the summit of Haslach's "local mountain", the Urenkopf, at a height of 554 m, stands the slim, beautiful Urenkopf Tower (183 steps) providing a magnificent panoramic view of the Central Black Forest as far as the River Rhine, the Vosges and the Schauinsland mountain near Freiburg.



The viewing tower is built using four main supports made from the trunks of heavy Douglas firs, braced with large, V-shaped struts in the same wood. The

steel staircase has comfortably closemeshed grating steps and rises via 11 platforms to the viewing platform, 33 m above the ground, which, at 43 m², is large enough to provide plenty of space for visitors.

The tower can only be reached on foot, using various routes of different lengths; the shortest way is from the "Urenkopf Tower hikers' car park" (B294), which takes about 25 minutes.

Black Forest Museum of Traditional Costumes / Old Capuchin Monastery



The Diack Forcet Musi

The Black Forest Museum of Traditional Costumes in Haslach in the Kinzig Valley displays over 100 lifelike costumed figures in large showcases, enhanced by beautifully crafted individual items and objects from farming life used on weekdays and festivals.

The museum is also in an unusual setting: The building that houses what is probably the most significant collection of traditional costumes in Baden-Württemberg is now the only completely surviving Capuchin monastery complex from the Baroque era throughout southern Germany.

The monastery church, Loreto chapel, cloister and monks' chancel, refectory, infirmary and an example of a cell show how the monks lived and how the former monastery was built.

Hansjakob Museum in the Freihof



The "Freihof" was built by the South German poet and priest Dr Heinrich Hansjakob (1837-1916) in 1913 as his retirement home. Since 1964, it has housed the Hansjakob Museum, which was completely remodelled in 2014 in line with modern perspectives. Using a wide range of exhibits, this literary museum presents Hansjakob as a complex personality and a versatile author, priest and politician.



The "Freihof" also contains two art exhibitions. On the first floor, there is an exhibition of the works of Carl Sandhaas (1801-1859), an important representative of South German Romanticism, and the top floor houses an extensive collection with works by Otto Laible (1898-1962), who was a member of the

"Baden Secession" group of artists and who, as a professor, worked on the rebuilding of the Karlsruhe Academy of Fine Arts after 1945.

St Afra Parish Church

Mühlenbach is famous for its colourful church festivals far beyond the borders of Germany. The Corpus Christi banner is one of the longest in Germany, and at the Harvest Festival, the Church of St Afra is decorated with countless beautifully designed corn images. On the Sunday two days before Shrove Tuesday, the service is enlivened by the humorous involvement of the the members of the Carnival Guild of Fools and the "Guggenmusik" bands.





A painting over the High Altar shows



the patron saint of the church, St Afra, whose feast day is celebrated on the first Sunday in August. The fire and chains are a symbol of her death as a martyr. On her right stand St Katharina and St Barbara. The side altar on the right is dedicated to the Fourteen Holy Helpers. The altar on the left shows the mysteries of the rosary on fifteen medallions.







Hansjakob Chapel



Hofstetten, where the priest, Black Forest author and politician Heinrich Hansiakob (1837-1916) is buried, is proud to be called the "Hansjakob village". It is even more proud to be known as "Paradise", which is what Hansjakob himself called it. Between 1901 and 1903, he had his tomb and chapel built up on the "Brand"

(a small hillock with a view right over to Haslach), according to plans by Max Meckel, the Archbishop's Director of Building, and he was buried there on 25 June 1916. The famous Freiburg glass painter Professor Fritz Geiges made the large stained-glass windows. The chapel and tomb are very popular with Hansjakob fans.



"Erzpoche" Open-Air Mining Museum



The museum complex is devoted to mining in the Kinzig Valley. It describes the difficult conditions in which the miners processed the mined ore in the olden days. Visitors can see the ladle, smelting furnace, washing plant and smithy and explore the beautifully laid out park. The "Dorfer Erzbrüder", an association founded in the year 1957 for the conservation of mining history, allows this part of the past to be brought back to life.

Village Church



The Village Church, or Dorfkirche, in Hausach is one of the oldest churches in the south-west and is also the town's oldest structure. The Roman tympanum over the "Blessings Door" and parts of the nave date from the 11th century. A few exposed remains also prove that the interior was decorated with frescoes: the Last Judgement on the west wall behind the organ is particularly significant, as it is unique in this region. It was also a miners' church in earlier times. Today, it is a cemetery church, a place for quiet reflection, a venue for concerts and a treasure trove of sacred art

Museum in the Manor House

The municipal museum is housed in the Manor House - a Baroque building dating from 1760. Visitors can learn about mining, agriculture, crafts and industry. The geological highlight of the museum is the largest tourmaline ever found in the Black Forest. The "Kaminzimmer" contains the Museum Library. The building is the birthplace of the last abbot of "St Peter in the Black Forest" - Ignaz Speckle.

Opening hours: Last Sunday in the month 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Husen Castle



Husen Castle soars strikingly over Hausach. The Castle was built in around 1220 under the dukes of Zähringen to protect the silver mines nearby. It was owned by the House of Fürstenberg for a long time. Weimar troops destroyed the castle during the Thirty Years War. It has never been rebuilt. It provides a magnificent view of the town, the Brandenkopf peak and the Kinzig Valley. Open-air events are held in the ruins in the summer

It can be reached on foot from the town centre via the Kreuzberg path in 20 minutes. The ruins are situated on the "Westweg" – follow the "Red Diamond".



Hasemann-Liebich Art Museum



The former Merchant's House, a striking half-timbered building in the centre of the village, is home to the Hasemann-

Liebich Art Museum. The two great Black Forest painters Wilhelm Hasemann and Curt Liebich lived and worked in Gutach. They founded the well known Gutach painters' colony, to which many famous artists belonged. Through their works,

they made both the Black Forest as a

cultural landscape and the beautiful

"Bollenhut" costumes world-famous in a number of superb paintings. The Museum stages regular special exhibitions presenting works of earlier masters and contemporary painters.



Fischerbach



Fischerbach – a sun trap and fruit orchard in the Central Kinzig Valley.

In spring, there are cherry and apple trees in full blossom, then strawberries. plums and apples with an incredible range in summer and early autumn, everything freshly picked and presented by direct sellers in farm shops and on stalls throughout the village. There are plenty of culinary delights to discover in Fischerbach, not just fruit, Farmers' bread cooked in wood-fired ovens, tomatoes, lettuces, juices, fine brandies and much more are an absolute delight! Round off your visit with a beautiful walk along the sunny slops, cycle or stroll along the Kinzig Valley cycle path - welcome to Fischerbach, the orchard village in the Central Kinzig Valley.





Summer Toboggan Run



The toboggan run in Gutach im Schwarzwald offers a very special treat. A lift system will take you to the top station, where the toboggan is released and the thrilling, action-packed downhill run starts. The 1,150 m long track runs in spirals, over jumps and through tunnels.

Experience the **Hornberg Shoot Experience Trail** from the town centre right up to the Schlossberg. On this walk with a difference, you'll laugh as you learn, at 14 stops along the way, the full, entertaining facts about the event in 1564 that made Hornberg so famous.





Black Forest Museum of Mycology



The Black Forest Museum of Mycology was established in 1962 as an exhibition of lifelike models of common wild mushrooms. This led to the formation of the unique School of Mycology and Environmental Protection. Here, you have the opportunity to compare models with the real thing and to learn about collecting and eating mushrooms. In

addition, mycology seminars are offered all year round.

The director of the Black Forest Museum of Mycology is happy to provide free advice about mushrooms.



Town Museum




The exhibition in the Town Museum is divided into three categories: History, customs and handicrafts. Particular highlights are the collection of prehistoric finds from neolithic and pre-Christian times, the exhibition of tableware showing the history of Hornberg from the old stoneware factory and the study of Dr Wilhelm Hausenstein, author and freeman of Hornberg, which has its original furnishings. In addition,

there are also farm implements from the olden days on show.

Hornberg Open-Air Theatre



It went like the Hornberg shooting is a very common saying!

Do you know what's behind it? Don't miss the opportunity to see the citizens of Hornberg re-enact the famous disaster from their past. What was probably the "most famous ducal reception" of the time is presented on stage with humour and a touch of irony. The performances on the open-air stage are brilliantly



supplemented by family and evening performances that change every year. The family plays offer outstanding entertainment for both old and young. Enthusiastic actors perform classic fairy tales and modern pieces that delight everyone, from small children to older adults. In the evening performances, visitors are entertained with plays that can be humorous or serious, often enhanced by special lighting effects. You'll be enchanted by the unique setting under the stars, with a view of the Powder Tower and the castle hill all around. A visit to one of the most beautiful open-air stages in Germany is definitely worthwhile!



Mountain Chapel



Dr Ludwig Stemmer (1828-1908) worked as a doctor and priest in Lauterbach. He was famous beyond the region for his "Kneipp methods" (cold water cures) and can thus also be described as the founder of tourism in Lauterbach. He was a great nature-lover and walked in the nearby forests every day. In 1890, he had a small chapel built, known as the "Bergkapelle" (mountain chapel), on a rock below the Trombach. It is made entirely of round timber, and the interior is very simple. The bell in the tower is often rung by hikers who stop here after their climb.

"Mooswald" Mill



Everything you need to set a grain-mill in motion can be seen in the "Mooswald" mill in Sulzbach near Lauterbach. That's what the documents pertaining to the mill from 1657 stipulate. The mill is also quite unique in that it is situated high up in the Black Forest. It is not only the mill but also the beautiful surroundings that make a visit well worth your while. The area around the Sulzbach valley is part of a nature reserve. Some of the people who

live here swear that they have seen the ghost of the mill in the clearing nearby. Guided tours on request.

How to get there:

Lauterbach – Sulzbach past the "Wilhelmshöhe" – exit Mooswald left.







Historic Old Town



The Lords of Wolfach and their castle (see 'Schlössle') were first mentioned in documents in 1084. In the 12th century, they founded a systematically planned, fortified town at the narrowest part of the Kinzig valley. The original town layout, with its broad main street and narrow alleys, has survived to this day. The "Lower Gate" and the "Hunger Tower" are the last witnesses to the time when the town was founded. The castle was given its present appearance in 1671/81 and, with the fresco-painted Town Hall and town houses standing close to each other, defines the historic town centre.



In the heart of the town, visitors can stroll around the shops, restaurants and cafés and enjoy the atmosphere. The large market square in front of the Town Hall provides a unique setting for the weekly markets and open-air events. Here, folklore evenings with the famous traditional "Bollenhut" costumes, concerts or the night-watchman's patrol are an unforgettable experience.

Water is present everywhere in Wolfach. It bubbles out of fountains, flows through the town stream in the main street, the "Riesner", and provides an opportunity to play and cool down in the Castle moat. The Kinzig flows through the heart of the town, keeping the landscaped areas and the Flößerpark cool and fresh.



Castle Museum



The Wolfach Museum is no longer just a traditional local history museum. Since the running of it has been taken over by an enthusiastic team of volunteers, it has been constantly reinventing itself and even the permanent exhibition of the town's history changes from year to year. In the winter, large special displays are presented, and regional artists and influential personalities are offered space for themed exhibitions.

Opening hours vary seasonally - check www.wolfach.info for up-to-date information.

"The Original"



Fashion designer Jochen Scherzinger, who has also become famous in the arts world through his photographs of Black Forest traditional costumes, has created a new work for Kirnbach which is unique in its own way. "The Original" is an open-air installation on the main road between Kirnbach and Gutach-Turm, showing five different citizens of Kirnbach in their traditional costumes.

The life-sized photos are a self-confident affirmation of the costumes and the region. "The Original" is a starting point for the Kirnbach "Bollenhut-Talwegle", a themed walk through the Kirnbach Valley.







"Schlössle" Castle Ruins



he Schlössle from the south

One kilometre to the north of Wolfach Old Town stand the clearly visible ruins of an old knight's castle on a hilltop surrounded by mighty beech trees. Alongside the defences and courtyard walls, the stump of the castle keep can also be seen. The ancestral castle of the Lords of Wolfach, now known affectionately as the "Schlössle", was built in the middle of the 11th century as the centre of their rule in the Kinzig and Wolf valley. The complex was abandoned after the town castle was built. Visitors can discover interesting details about the material from which the castle was built on the geological tour "About gneiss and granite" (start at the Weihermatte playground).



Churches in Wolfach



A Late Gothic reticulated vault and 700 year-old frescoes in the Catholic town church of St Laurentius, a Baroque interior and impressive paintings in the Pilgrimage Church of St Jakob and in the Castle Chapel, Neo-Gothic elements at the Pilgrimage Church of St Roman, simple, yet impressive interior fittings in the Protestant churches in Wolfach and Kirnbach - every church interior is unique and invites everyone, whether believers or not, to come in and spend a while relaxing, chilling out and switching off from the hubbub of everyday life.



"Dorotheenhütte"



Popular: Glass-blowing for visitors

The history of glass-making in the Black Forest dates back centuries. The last crystal glass factory which still practices the traditional art of melting and shaping the glass, blowing it and then cutting it by hand is the Dorotheenhütte in Wolfach.

Visitors also have the unique opportunity to create their own coloured vase under the guidance of the glass makers.

The glass museum takes you on a journey through more than 2,000 years of glass history. The cinema in the museum tells visitors all about the production of high-quality crystal glasses. The museum also includes the history of Christmas tree decorations, with over 1.000 exhibits.

The large factory shop next door offers a huge selection of crystal glasses. There is also a stunningly decorated Christmas village, presenting a vast range of hand-blown Christmas tree

decorations. In the Market Barn, you can buy regional products, from Black Forest cherry schnapps to Black Forest Whisky. Other products (such as Zeller ceramics - Cock and Hen, Steiff, ...) round off the selection

When it comes to food and drink. the nature reserve chef in the "Hüttenklause" restaurant/café serves regional specialities such as the home-made filled pasta cases found throughout Baden and Swabia, or homecooked Black Forest cherry gateau.

Slag Heap "Grube Clara"

The slag heap of the mine "Grube Clara" is not only for adults but also for families. A special part of the area around the old mine has been partitioned off and here you can chisel away at the rocks and stones. The "Grube Clara" is one of two mines in the world with the largest amount of minerals. Collectors have already found over 400 different minerals here. New material from the mine is added to the area every now and then to keep the attractivity.

The museum provides a fascinating insight into the technology of timber rafting and the life of the raftsmen. The citizens of Schiltach and Wolfach dominated timber rafting as far as Strasbourg until the end of the 19th century. This was the cutting-edge transport industry of the times! There are also displays covering tanning and timber: Leather manufacture, forest management, timber working, half-timbered building and bark collection for bark tanning. An old saw that is still water-driven and the power transmitting



mechanism for the complex are also worth seeing. The section on timber rafting includes a model of a raft used on the River Kinzig. The annex contains an exhibition of leather crafts with many samples of leather.

Half-timbered houses, timber rafting, a lively history and picturesque squares await you when you visit the little town of Schiltach in the central Kinzig Valley. The Old Town of Schiltach is one of the most famous and loveliest day trip destinations in the Black Forest. Here it is possible to enjoy the peace and charm of the little romantic spa town all year round - the kind of little town that only appears in picture books. The unique half-timbered historic Old Town with countless artistically renovated half-timbered

buildings, the medieval market square with its fountain and 16th century Town Hall and the four Schiltach museums make the town the perfect destination for a day trip. The town has proudly maintained its traditions and cultural treasures, such as timber rafting, leather and sawn handicrafts, for years and yet has still managed to keep up with the times. Schiltach lies at the confluence of the Schiltach and Kinzig rivers, bordered by forested slopes. Schiltach is also the



ideal starting point for excursions and exploratory trips in the Black Forest. It is a wonderful base for discovering the wonders of nature all around.





A living piece of Black Forest history

Schiltach offers the visitor a range of attractions. For one thing, there are four museums, covering town and industrial history, timber rafting and handicrafts waiting to be discovered. The best way to explore Schiltach is on a guided tour. Open guided tours, free of charge, are offered by the Schiltach Tourist Information Office every Friday afternoon at 3 p.m. from May to September inclusive, starting from the Schüttesäge

building (Hauptstrasse 1). You can book your preferred dates for your trip at any time. of course.



"Schenkenburg" Castle Ruins



This former castle is the landmark of Schenkenzell; the seat of the "Schenken von Celle" (1244). It is one of the oldest castles in the Kinzig Valley. The castle became the property of the Fürstenbergs as from 1500 and was destroyed in 1534. It used to be a Norman castle, a watchtower and keep. Unfortunately it was never rebuilt. The castle ruins are easily accessible via a footpath.

The castle ruins are situated halfway between Schiltach and Schenkenzell. A themed trail around 1 km long with 10 information boards brings the story of the Schenkenburg to life for hikers.



Convent Museum Wittichen



Convent Museum: Old hand-carved crosses for graves, ornaments and a number of objects of value can be seen here. The history of mining in Wittichen is also represented. Showcases full of objects dating back to the times when the mines were still in use. There is also the possibility of digging yourself nearby as well as a geological trail to follow and gather further information. The church is open daily from 8 a.m. to

Convent at Wittichen: The Beguine sister Luitgard founded a hermitage in 1324. This was later recognised as a convent. The story goes that a number of miracles happened at her grave and that is why ever since then people have made and still make their pilgrimages to Wittichen. Guided tours of the church and museum are available for groups on request.

Adventure trails for families

Robber Hotzenplotz Trail (Gengenbach)

The famous children's book "Hotzenplotz the Robber" by Ottfried Preussler, has given its name to two different "Robbers' Trails" and Grandma's Fruit Garden. In Gengenbach, a complete nature trail

is dedicated to the hero of countless children, with lots of activity stations for balancing, climbing and throwing quaranteed to be great fun.

Zeller Bachsteig (Zell am Harmersbach)

Hanna – daughter of the famous "Rooster and Hen" couple from Zeller Keramik goes with you as you experience the wonderfully "refreshing" feeling of exploring a town from its stream.

Over a distance of 1.6 km - in the stream and on land - the Zeller Bachsteig leads right through the Old Town to the Fürstenberger Hof Local Museum.

Hademar Nature Experience Trail (Oberharmersbach)

Come with us on a short forest walk with a "wow" effect! Hademar Waldwichtel will tell you about his world in over 20 experience stations along the way. The nature experience trail, around 2 km long, takes you on an entertaining quest through nature. Creatively designed stations arouse your curiosity and provide information to children while leaving scope for their imagination.

Bächlewald (Haslach)

The adventure trail, which is about 4 km long, starts with an overview board at the "Waldsee Terrasse" inn and leads through the forest along little paths and forest trails. There's a chance to let off steam, explore nature, practice skills, have fun, enjoy the landscape - and then relax in the beer garden and playground, with mini-golf course and at the lake "Waldsee".

Adventure Trail (Hausach)

Kirnbach "Bollenhut" Valley Path (Wolfach)
